## Interns help expand, improve exhibits throughout Homestead

The Glidden Homestead is benefiting from the creativity and expertise of two interns from Northern Illinois University. The two began their internships this summer and will continue through the fall.

Nicole Weydert and Brigette Massoth have updated and professionalized signage and exhibits throughout the Homestead under the direction of Marcia Wilson, executive director. They are helping to create a special space on the lower level for a children's area complete with a hand-painted mural. They also have created the Glidden Family Tree pictured at right.

Weydert is a senior majoring in art history with a double minor in anthropology and French. She is from DeKalb, and said "working with the Glidden Homestead has been a great opportunity to help out my home town. I have really enjoyed working on existing and new exhibits; the Glidden history is rich and interesting."

Weydert added that she is "constantly learning new things, and everyone is such a pleasure to work with. The experiences from this internship will help me in museum work and in teaching, which I hope to pursue after graduation."

Massoth, from Geneva, will graduate in December. She is a design technology major with an emphasis in scenic design in the School of Theatre and Dance. She has spent the last four years studying painting, building, props, costumes, makeup, and lighting.

"I definitely enjoy working with the Glidden Homestead. I'm used to working on a team, but collaborating with Nicole and Marcia is a great

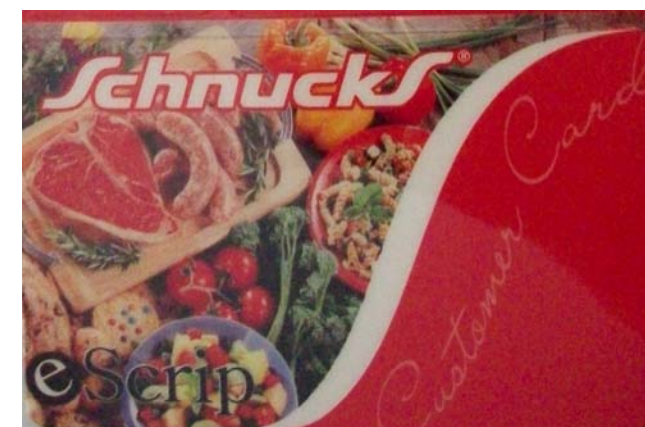
## Use card at Schnucks to benefit Glidden Homestead

## Dedication of Blacksmith Shop planned Sunday, Oct. 24



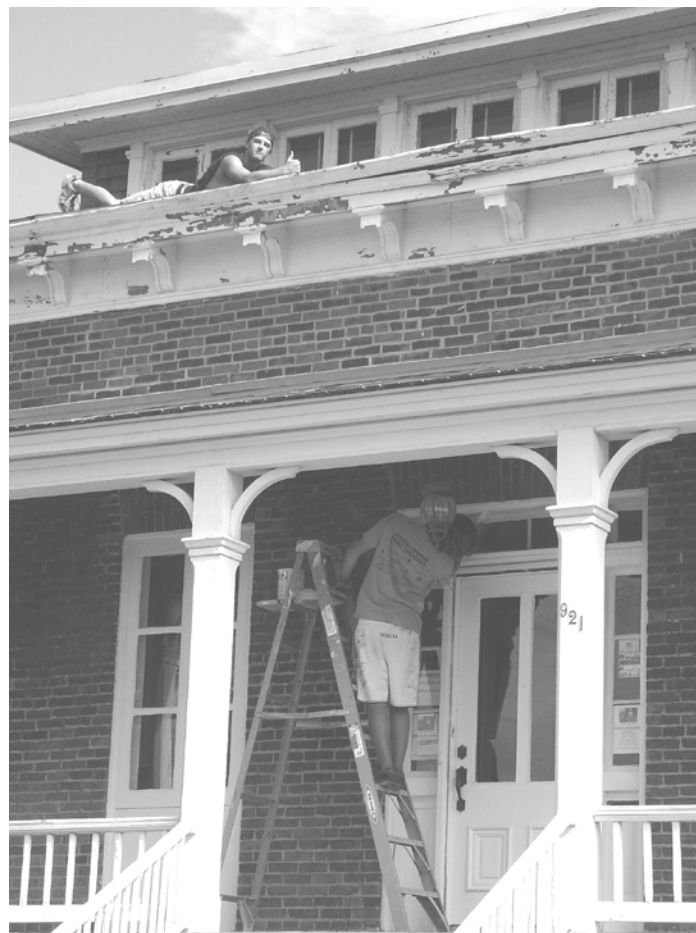
Blacksmith Chris Hubbard (left) demonstrated his talents in the Glidden Homestead Blacksmith Shop during an open house in June.

Kite Fest is organized by the DeKalb County Convention and Visitors Bureau. Skies over DeKalb are filled with colorful and imaginative kites of all types and sizes. Kite Fest is held on NIU's "North 40," near Annie's Woods, off Lucinda Avenue at Kishwaukee Drive.

Features include kite-making, food vendors, and a candy drop for kids. Admission is free. VIP parking is \$3.



## Improvements at the Homestead

Exterior and interior paint, new storm windows and the restoration of picture rails are just some of the ongoing projects at the Glidden Homestead.

"Many restoration projects have been accomplished in the house since Spring with the help of mostly volunteer labor," said Kathy Siebrasse, board president.

Work includes new paint and flooring in a second floor room dedicated for the Homestead's archives. A volunteer committee has been working over the years to catalog and preserve photographs and important documents.

Currently, only one of the five second floor rooms is open for viewing, called "Jessie's Room." It is furnished and decorated to be representative of a woman's bedroom from the early 1900s. It is hoped that a second bedroom upstairs can be opened in the near future.

Volunteer Wes Wilson has helped the Homestead create a picture rail in the long hallway on the main floor. The picture rail will allow for use of the hall for exhibits and artwork without damaging the walls.

"If you haven't visited the Homestead recently, please plan to do so. Check the calendar on the facing page to find a date that fits your schedule. Remember, Homestead members receive free admission!" said Siebrasse.

## Tour DeKalb's Barbed Wire sites as part of Patent Day celebration

Join the Patent Day celebration at the Joseph F. Glidden Homestead and Historical Center Sunday, Nov. 7, noon-4 p.m. Special displays, Homestead tours and refreshments will be part of the day's events.

Patent Day celebrates Joseph Farwell Glidden's patent for "The Winner" barbed wire, which was granted Nov. 24, 1874. Today, 136 years later, The Winner is still the most popular type of barbed wire manufactured and in use.

A Barbed Wire Bus Tour, led by local historian, Steve Bigolin, is a special feature of the day. Cost for the tour of DeKalb's historically-significant barbed wire sites is \$8, with limited seating on a TransVAC bus. The bus leaves the Homestead at 2 p.m., and the tour lasts about one-and-one-half hours.
